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## Fiftieth Anniversary for Annual Safety Awards

Each year, safety awards are presented at special dinner events held in each of the four West Coast Areas. These awards honor PMA member companies, ILWU locals, and individual longshore workers for outstanding achievements in on-the-job occupational safety and health during the previous year.

#### Fifty Years of Safety Awards

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Safety Awards in Washington and Oregon. Northern California and Southern California will celebrate the 50th anniversary of their Safety Awards in 1999.

The Annual Safety Awards were started in 1949 in the Pacific Northwest by the Waterfront Employers Association of the Pacific Coast, a precursor of Pacific Maritime Association.

To qualify for an award, a member company must actively participate in the PMA Safety Program and report all occupational injuries and illnesses and all applicable payroll hours for the previous calendar year.

Member companies are categorized according to the type of operation in which

they are predominantly involved. Qualification rules may vary among Areas for Area awards. Within each category, companies are further grouped according to the number of payroll hours during the year. Because the type of cargo handling operations varies among the four Areas, not all awards categories exist in each Area.

Awards are presented to qualifying

member companies with the lowest injury/illness incidence rate within their respective category and group. In addition, awards are presented to ILWU longshore, clerk, and foreman locals based on similar criteria.

The Injury and Illness Incidence Rate is based on Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) recordkeeping criteria and is a national standard used by the government and most industries to quantify overall injury/illness trends.

Individual longshore, clerk, and foreman employees with more than 10 years of continuous service without any incidents of lost-time injury were also recognized.

## Four Honored with Life Saving Awards

On August 12, 1997, Reggie Garcia, a Metropolitan Stevedore superintendent, was partially buried by an avalanche of carbon coke.

Mr. Garcia had been inspecting an avalanche site that had partially buried a loader. Without warning, the 20,000-ton mountain of carbon coke shifted again and pinned him against the wheel of the loader and the falling carbon coke.

At great risk to themselves, several longshore workers rushed to Mr. Garcia's aid: Richard Alvarez, Brad Bradley, Eddie Martin, and Max Teel saved Mr. Garcia's life. They moved carbon coke by hand away from his head and upper body until the Long Beach Fire Department arrived.

For their heroic efforts, Messrs. Alvarez, Bradley, Martin, and Teel were honored with Life-Saving Awards in the Southern California Awards dinner.


